ANZAC Day Children's' story 2024 - Lynn Patzel

This year stories are to be shared memories from young children of the second world war as experienced by my good friend Florence and myself.

One of the good things about getting older is that we have a vast bank of memories to share with family and friends. We were both very young, Florence born just before the war and myself at the end.

Our child hoods were lives of restraint as thousands of men, young and older had gone to war overseas, leaving far fewer men and by necessity, counting on the women to look after Australia, taking care of our industries and growing food.

One of the necessary regulations for keeping us all fed and clothed was to introduce a system called rationing, or making it fair and equal to everyone. This was necessary because we didn't have enough of everything for people to buy whatever the felt they wanted. Much of our produce was going to Great Britain to keep their population fed, and in the midst of war battle, food for our soldiers too, plus we also sent money to aid the war costs.

So, in May 1942 rationing was gazetted to manage shortages and make sure everyone had an equal share of food and clothing.

Rationing was controlled by the forced use of coupons and at first was limited to clothing, tea, sugar, butter, cheese and meat, eggs, and milk.

Other necessities were added later, like petrol.

It didn't matter how wealthy you were; money couldn't buy everything! you had to have the required coupons for the amount of members in your family. Your coupons were exchanged for goods along with their purchase price. Breaking the law meant a fine of \$200 or 6 months gaol.

When I was born, my mother didn't have enough coupons to buy baby clothing, cradle bedding or nappies needed. So much repurposing of used clothing was made into baby clothes and blankets. Some of her friends used their coupons to buy baby items for her.

Rationing continued for some 6 years after the war, while our country recovered, and all of our soldiers came home.

I remember that I had one only, doll for my lifetime. I still have her. By the time my parents could have been able to buy another, I'd passed by the doll age.

Living with rationing was difficult for all the family. Before you went shopping, you had to make sure you had your ration book, or you couldn't make a purchase. The number of people in your family controlled how much you could buy.

I have a few examples and while some amounts look fair, remember that cooking had to be adjusted by the person cooking the meals. This included cakes, biscuits, jams, and sauces for the entire family.

Butter 1 lb for 2 weeks (1/2 kilo)

Sugar 2lbs for 2 weeks (one kilo)

Tea 8ozs for 5 weeks (.2 Kilo)

Meat 2 lbs for 1 week (one Kilo)

1 egg for 1 week

1oz cheese for two weeks (.02 kilo)

Petrol 5 gallons (approx. 20litres): but one had to have a petrol licence according to your private and farming needs, as well as producing the coupons.

Socks were worth 4 coupons, when your entire years clothing coupons were worth only 112.

I wonder how we'd all manage if rationing were to occur again?

Ration Biscuits

1 tbsp. margarine

2 tbsp. sugar

4 tbsp. grated raw carrot

6 tbsp. plain flour

Half tsp. baking powder

Vanilla



- 1. Cream the fat and the sugar until fluffy.
- 2. Mix in carrot, vanilla, flour, and baking powder.
- 3. Form into small balls, place onto oven tray, and flatten.
- 4. Bake in a moderate oven until golden. 12-15 mins. Makes 6-7 biscuits.

Recipe of the Month

CHICKEN, LEEK AND RICOTTA PASTA

1/4 cup olive oil
100g bacon cut into lardons
2 medium-sized leeks, finely sliced
1/2 bunch of thyme, leaves picked
500g chicken thigh fillets, cut into 1cm strips

2 cups cooking cream300g firm, fresh ricotta300 pasta (any shape), cooked and drained130g Parmesan or Pecorino cheese. grated

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 or 160FF.
- 2. Heat oil in a large ovenproof pan over medium heat and add bacon, leeks, half the thyme and 1/2 teaspoon salt flakes. Cook stirring for 20 minutes until leeks are very soft.
- 3. Increase heat to medium, add chicken and cook for about 10 minutes, until just cooked through.
- 4. Add cream and bring to a simmer. Cook for 5 minutes until cream has slightly reduced.
- 5. Remove from heat and cool slightly, then stir in ricotta, remaining thyme and pasta. Coat pasta in the sauce. Season well.
- 6. Scatter with cheese and bake for 30 minutes or until golden and bubbling.
- 7. Allow to stand for 10 minutes before serving.
- 8. Scatter with black pepper.

At its March meeting, Council

- received the Biannual Audit and Risk Committee report for March 2024;
- refused a Planning Permit for a twolot subdivision (excision of dwelling) on Cooriemungle Road, Cooriemungle;
- Adopted the new
 - Naming of Roads, Features and Localities Policy;
 - Events and Festivals Grant Program Policy;
 - Support for Events and Festivals (Traffic Management and Associated Local Law Fee Exemptions) Policy; and
 - Business Continuity Policy;
- revoked the Community Planning Infrastructure Policy dated November 2019;
- adopted a new the Cattle Underpasses Policy;
- varied the Special Charge Scheme for new footpath on the eastern side of Timboon Curdievale Road - from Lambert Street to Haywards Road – Timboon, to acknowledge the final costs, and resolved to call on property owners for payment;
- endorsed the substitution of the Skipton Jubilee Park Carpark project for the Morris Street footpath project of \$89,890 for Phase B funding under the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and referred the Morris Street footpath project to the 2024-2025 Budget process for consideration;
- approved \$2,000 excl GST from the Business Assistance Scheme to Alderwood Manor: and
- noted the Ready Now Grants program quarterly report (December 2023 to

February 2024) including:

- Camperdown Bowling Club (\$495) to replace a defibrillator battery;
- Camperdown Pastoral and Agricultural Society (\$500) towards relocation of water meter:
- Terang and District Probus Club (\$384) to buy a portable speaker;
- Port Campbell Rifle Club (\$500) to buy a solar water pump;
- Port Campbell Public Purpose Reserve Committee of Management (\$500) for materials to build a portable nine-hole mini-golf course;
- Lake Bookaar Recreation Reserve Committee of Management (\$500) to buy roadside signage; and
- resolved to write to the Minister for Communications and nbnCo asking for an update on the implementation of the Regional Connectivity Program which was to see fibre to the premise installed to 531 premises in Timboon and if the project has indeed been cancelled.

Councils are the closest level of government to community. To represent their communities successfully, they need quality candidates to put their hand up for election.

Prospective Council election candidates are invited to attend information sessions being held around the state. The nearest to Corangamite Shire is in Warrnambool on Thursday 27 June.

Corangamite Shire Chief Executive Officer David Rae will be part of a CEO panel at the session in Warrnambool.

"The importance of strong local leadership can't be understated and I encourage all interested candidates to attend," Mr Rae said.

"Corangamite has a strong history of community representation by community leaders who put their hand up and become a candidate.

"I encourage anyone thinking about standing to come along or log in to the session and utilise the resources of the MAV Stand for Council campaign.

The MAV will provide copies of the 'Citizen to Councillor Guide 2024' to help prospective candidates understand the roles and responsibilities of a councillor and the importance of this elected position.

"The evening will cover topics such as the role and purpose of local government and councillors' roles, responsibilities and expectations once elected," Mr Rae said.

"Attendees will also receive information about the Corangamite area, the electoral processes and previous councillors' experiences," he said.

MAV CEO Kelly Grisby said the MAV Stand for Council campaign is designed to encourage and support a diverse range of candidates from across the Victorian community including first nations, and new and emerging communities.

"If you are thinking of nominating for council as a candidate, these sessions and resources will help you to further consider the broad responsibilities of a councillor, the wide range of issues you will be required to make decisions about and the time commitment," Ms Grigsby explained.
