#### Recipe of the Month

#### CHOCOLATE-CARAMEL FONDANT PUDDINGS

200g dark chocolate, chopped 100g unsalted butter, chopped 2 eggs and 2 egg yolks extra 1/2 cup caster sugar
1/4 cup plain flour
4 tablespoons store-bought caramel spread

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 200 degrees (180 FF), and grease 4 one cup dariole moulds.
- 2. Place chocolate and butter in double boiler and melt over barely simmering water.
- 3. Place eggs, yolks and sugar in a bowl and whisk until combined; add the chocolate mixture and flour, and whisk gently again.
- 4. Spoon 2/3 of the mixture into the dariole moulds; spoon 1 tablespoon caramel into the centre of each mould, then spoon over the remaining chocolate mixture.
- 5. Place the moulds onto a baking tray, and bake for 16-18 minutes, until puffed.
- 6. Gently turn puddings out, and if liked, dust with cocoa or icing sugar to serve.

#### Mount Noorat School Teachers' Residence Celebrates 150 Years

A small cottage, which stands in Noorat (but once situated beside the Mount Noorat School) was built in April 1874, at a cost of £214, for the residence of the first Head Teacher; the widowed Mrs Margaret Evens and her five children. In the previous year, Mrs Evans was appointed first Head Mistress of the Mount Noorat School, but she and her five children had to reside at the *Mount Noorat Hotel* for six months until a school teacher's residence was built.

In 1974, a request was make for a room in the teacher's residence to be set aside for a post office. This request was initially denied but evidence shows that the building did become a post office, probably under the watchful eye of Margaret Evans.

In 1877, Margaret Carson married James Carson and in the same year, a daughter was born to them while residing in the school teacher's residence.

In 1979, Niel Black of *Mount Noorat House* wrote a letter to the Shire of Hampden requesting that the road between his home and the post office in Noorat, be improved as drays were sinking so far into the mud that two teams of bullocks were needed to extricate them.

In 1879, two of Margaret's children (of her first marriage) died during a diphtheria epidemic which ravaged many of her pupils and was reported to have started in the school toilets.

In 1882, Margaret and James Carson had a son Thomas and in the same year Margaret's husband James died, leaving her again widowed. In 1886, their son Thomas died aged 4.

In 1883, Margaret transferred to the Framlingham School leaving a tragic life spent in the school teacher's residence behind her. The teacher's residence was then occupied by John Winter, his wife and two daughters. John became post master as well as head teacher and was also Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages. His daughter Minnie subsequently became the post mistress under her father's watchful eye, and she operated from the veranda of the teacher's residence.

In 1885, another death occurred while John Winter's and his family were residing in the teacher's residence when his daughter Mary died age 12, after a long illness.

In 1900, John Winter retired from teaching and his daughter Minnie retired as postmistress on the same day. The post office was granted to Mrs Hannah Dwyer and was then situated in the same building as in 2024. (In 2025 the Noorat Post Office will celebrate 125 years of postal service at the same site.)

In 1914, When John Chapman became the head teacher; he purchased a residence almost directly opposite the school. Mrs Mary Carmody and her husband Thomas then moved into the school teacher's residence where she became the school caretaker and sometimes boarded the junior teachers. While residing in the school teacher's house, Mary and Thomas had the four sons who become the best friends of Alan Marshall. (I Can Jump Puddles)

In 1921, the school council was very anxious that the former teacher's residence should be renovated or preferably replaced. Late in April 1922, Mrs Carmody, who had rented the residence and had acted

as school caretaker for the past twenty one years, was asked to vacate the premises. She wrote a letter objecting, but her letter fell on deaf ears.

In June 1922, the school teacher's residence was sold for removal and moved to its present site in Noorat where at some stage, it became the home of J. O'Connor. Mrs Carmody and her family moved to live in Terang. A local, who viewed the interior of the former school teacher's house some years ago, said that the post office fittings were then still intact within the house.

So Happy150th Birthday Little Cottage, as the oldest, surviving, weatherboard building in Noorat.

#### School Days

Earlier in February, a grandchild and two great grandchildren started on their big learning adventure at school.

Many days, over several months of preparation took place to ensure their transition was smooth. Remember, much of their early childhood learning took place at home during lockdown especially those living in Melbourne. They experienced play dates, meet the teachers, art lessons, library lessons and received a welcome letter from their new 'buddies'. Their parents were introduced to staff over 'bickies, cheese and wine' nights before family interviews.

All parents were able to attend day one and see their respective children happily settled into their new classrooms.

Many readers will be thinking by now... this is different to my first day at school! Times have certainly changed!

My preparation for school in the 50's was to learn to ride a two wheeled bike to be even able to ATTEND school.

The bike was bought bigger than I needed so it would last me longer. The next thing was to paint 'said' bike to make it presentable for school.

On my first day my father dropped me and my bike off in the farm ute. He kindly met me at the halfway mark to make sure I knew the best way home.

The next seven years were hard slog, rain and mud in winter and sand drifts during summer, 8.5 kilometres each way, every day (no Wednesdays off for me). The only down hill run was just before home! A tough gig for a little girl, alone.

Buses were not provided until I was well into secondary school. Eighteen children from two generations left the family farm each day for their education. By the time the last one left school, both primary and secondary school buses used my brother's circular driveway to pick all kids up at their DOOR. Yes times have changed, but for the better.



# New Corangamite wards for October election

When Corangamite residents vote in the Council election in October, they will elect one Councillor from each of seven Wards.

The seven Wards are named Cooriemungle, Gnotuk, Lake Elingamite, Lake Keilambete, Leura, Mt Elephant and Tandarook.

Local Government Minister Melissa Horne this week announced the old five ward structure would be replaced in line with recommendation of the Victoria Electoral Commission.

The biggest change is the former Central Ward being divided into:

- Lake Keilambete Ward, comprising Terang and Noorat;
- Gnotuk Ward reaching to the middle of Camperdown; and
- Leura Ward from Central Camperdown to the east.

A slightly enlarged North Ward will be known as Mt Elephant Ward.

South-West Ward will remain largely unchanged but will be Lake Elingamite Ward.

Coastal Ward, renamed Cooriemungle, will take a small amount of territory from South Central, which will be called Tandarook.

The recommendations were based on an independent review that considered issues such as:

- the representation needs of specific communities;
- public submissions;
- nature and complexity of services council provides;
- geographic size and topography of the area;
- · forecast population and voter growth or decline; and
- social diversity.

Corangamite Shire Mayor Kate Makin said the last review of Corangamite Shire was in 2015.

"The old mix of four Wards with one councillor each, but three in the more populous Central Ward, is no longer allowed under the new Local Government Act," Cr Makin said.

"Council made a submission to the review advocating for a Ward structure rather than an unsubdivided Council.

"Because there is so much ground to cover in our big Shire, Wards mean residents will still have a local representative who understands what is important to them.

"While they can talk to any Councillor, there will still be a local face they can easily contact and talk to one-on-one."

The Mayor thanked all of the community members who got involved in the review process.

"There was a lot of feedback from the community to Council and 14 members of the public made formal submissions alongside the one from Council.

"It's great to see people taking an active role in how the Shire is governed.

"The subdivided structure has worked well for the Shire in the past and while this is slightly different, particularly with Camperdown, Council has always worked together for the good of the wider community."



# Glass bottle and jar bins on the way

More than 5,500 premises across Corangamite Shire are about to get a fourth wheelie bin for bottles and jars.

Under the State Government's 'Circular Economy (Waste Reduction and Recycling) Act 2021', glass recyclables will no longer be able to be recycled through the yellow comingled recycling bin.

Cr Jamie Vogels, who represents Corangamite on the Barwon South West Local Government Waste Forum, said the glass bins would be collected monthly with the first collection in May.

"With a fourth bin, residents will be able to reduce contamination of the recyclable materials and keep glass out of landfill," Cr Vogels said.

"Glass will no longer be able to go in the co-mingled recycling bin with paper and plastics as glass breakages contaminate other recyclables.

"Only glass bottles and jars can be accepted in the purple bin.

"Other types of glass, like windows and Pyrex, have different melting points and can't be turned into bottles or jars.

"The new bin will make the recycling process more efficient and will mean less materials going to landfill

"If you aren't sure what can go in each bin check Council's website for an A-Z guide for which bin."

Coordinator Waste and Environmental Sustainability Sofia Myers said kerbside collection customers will get a new 120L bin on their regular collection day in April.

"It will take 2-3 weeks to complete the roll-out across the Shire," Ms Myers said.

"Glass collection will be once a month, so there will be less wear on the bin.

"To lengthen the lifespan of the older bins, the red lidded ones will be re-fitted with a purple lid to become the glass bin. The red lid will go on the new bin."

The Victorian State Government Circular Economy (Waste and Recycling) Act 2021 aims to increase the amount of material that can be recycled up to 80% by 2030. Corangamite Shire's kerbside waste diversion is currently at 63%.

# It's OK to talk if fire conditions trigger memories

After recent "extreme" and "catastrophic" fire conditions around the state, community members are encouraged to look out for friends and neighbours.

Corangamite Shire Mayor Kate Makin said the conditions could stir up difficult memories and feelings about past emergencies.

"Our thoughts are with those people across Victoria, including on the northern borders of our Shire in places like Pomonal and Beaufort," Cr Makin said.

"Our own communities are no strangers to bushfire and have shown great resilience and mutual support through past emergencies.

"For some people a hot windy day, or a news report about bushfires, can bring back troubling memories and feelings.

"Even years later unexpected thoughts can still be powerful. Acknowledging them can be important steps to recovery."

Cr Makin encouraged anyone to share how they were feeling with someone they trust.

"It could be a family member, friend, your GP or minister. Just having someone to share with can help you put your feelings into perspective.

"Putting your thoughts and memories into words can be soothing in itself.

"And of course, if someone around you seems withdrawn or loses their temper over something small, don't be afraid to ask the question: 'Are you OK?'

"Just starting the conversation can make all the difference."

Cr Makin paid tribute to emergency service volunteers and others in local and regional communities.

"A huge thanks to those who have helped in past emergencies and to those who volunteer their time to train and stand ready for future emergencies.

"The inevitable can always happen so please increase your awareness of fire danger ratings, as well as Community Based Emergency Management Plans and personal bushfire plans, which mean we are more prepared."
